Dear Friends,

As we put this annual report together, I was increasingly overwhelmed and inspired by your generosity over the course of 2012. Thank you SO much for the gifts you made to ensure that orphan children could know the love of a permanent family!

Our deepest prayer is that each child will come to know God's personal love and purpose for their individual lives BECAUSE of their new families and the stability they provide. You have been an integral part of making this happen over the last year. We know that this is a tough economic time in our own country, yet your compassion for children who don't know the love of a mother and father prodded you to give even when it often meant a sacrifice for you and your own family. That kind of selfless giving has been the source of great encouragement to our team and staff and makes us ever more vigilant in ensuring that your gifts are going to the children and families who need them most.

This last summer our team had the chance to visit with many former orphans who had been adopted. Their adoptive parents told us verbally what a blessing their adopted children have been in their lives. Yet, more powerful than words was actually seeing four year old little Anya (biological child of the Isaev family in Mariupol, Ukraine) cling to her adopted sister Ira (9), and witnessing the friendship that Olga and Mila (adoptive sisters in the Kravchuk family in St. Petersburg, Russia) share as adults, both awaiting the birth of their first child. Tears welled up in the eyes of Gennady Makhnienko when he told us proudly that his 16-year old adopted son, Sergei, has been sober for over three years now. The young boy had been addicted to alcohol since the age of five, long before he met Gennady, but today he is an incredibly hard worker who hopes to help other children at the Pilgrim Rehabilitation center where he was rescued from the streets.

It was apparent in these meetings that not only has your generosity blessed children who needed to be adopted, but the relationships they have formed with their adoptive families have allowed that blessing to expand to every person in their new family. You have not only rescued individual children, but you have allowed them to dream and form healthy relationships that will affect thousands of other people for generations to come. Through the relationships and the love they experience in their families, we know that these formerly orphaned children will have the opportunity to truly experience Christ's love for them.

Yet, despite the great joy we experienced every time we met a child whose life had been changed by adoption due to generous people like you, we also witnessed the sad reality that millions of children in our world are still waiting for that chance. Last month I wrote to you about a little girl named Inga at the Pilgrim Center in Mariupol, Ukraine. As long as children like her are still waiting with longing in their hearts to be adopted into loving families, we must continue to work hard on their behalf. Thank you for inspiring us and giving us the courage to continue in the mission of providing a home for every orphan. We hope you will continue to help orphans in 2013!

from neglect to love... Yura's story of rescue



Because you cared enough to give, little Yura finally found a family who cherishes him! For the first twelve years of his life, Yura was beaten and verbally abused by his alcoholic father; his mother had died at a young age. Told daily that he was a curse and a burden, the little boy began to believe those awful words. As if these examples of hardship were not enough in this young child's life, Yura is also HIV positive. His father's neglect and poverty meant that he went weeks, sometimes months, without medical treatments. When Yura was taken into custody by social workers, they took photos of his frail body covered in nasty bruises and lacerations from his beatings.

This last year, shortly after Yura had been rescued from his dire situation, **the Isaev family of Mariupol, Ukraine transformed his life forever when they adopted him**. The Isaevs have long been known for their strong Christian faith and generosity, as they are the first family in Ukraine to have adopted an HIV positive child. They now have eight adopted children (seven of whom are HIV+) in addition to their two biological children. **This amazing, loving family would not have been able to take Yura into their home had it not been for our generous donors like you who helped to support them in a variety of ways over the last two years!**

As an example of how much Yura's life has changed, his adoptive father, Yevgenniy, shared a story with us: One day Yevgenniy got a call from one of Yura's teachers alerting him to the fact that Yura had not been doing his homework. The next morning Yevegenniy told Yura before he left for school that they would have to "have a talk" when he returned. In Yura's past life, "having a talk" with his biological father had always meant a severe beating. Heart racing, Yura fled the school after second period and had run nearly 15 miles before Yevgenniy caught up to him. Yevgenniy explained, with tears in his eyes, that he would never beat Yura and that Yura had been a blessing to their family from the day he had arrived.

Today the bond between this loving father and his son is obvious. Yura dreams of becoming a famous cook some day, and told us that his favorite things to make are blini (pancakes) and soup. **Thank you for giving this little boy the chance to dream!**

life-saving medical care

Doctors thought little German would never find a family because of his medical diagnosis—failure to thrive combined with childhood diabetes. However, from the moment they saw him, Roman and Larissa knew that German was the son for them. Unfortunately, they lacked the money to cover German's medical expenses and to provide him with the care he needed for his diabetes. Thanks to your generosity, we were able to provide little German with life-saving medical care this year!

Ukraine Without Orphans

Two years ago, our partners in Ukraine launched a movement called Ukraine Without Orphans. Their dream is to empty the orphanages in Ukraine through believers caring for orphans through adoption and foster care.

We're so excited to share with you that your giving has helped make that dream a reality! For the first time in history, there are now waiting lists in Ukraine to adopt children under the age of 7! There are still many older orphans and disabled orphans who need families, so the work is not yet done, but amazing progress has been made!

Our national partners in Ukraine are doing amazing work-- from hosting training conferences to publishing resources to providing emergency hotlines for families in crisis. Thank you for supporting them! In addition to supporting Ukraine Without Orphans, your giving has helped to support the launch of Russia Without Orphans, Belarus Without Orphans, and Latvia Without Orphans! The vision from Ukraine is spreading to former Soviet Bloc countries, and we believe that we will see it spread globally! Towards that goal, we are working with our national partners in Ukraine to launch a World Without Orphans movement which would strive to provide families and care for orphans around the world.

Sophia was 12 years old when her mother died in the hospital after being beaten by Sophia's stepfather. Left wondering who would care for her two sisters, Sophia recounts:







Dear Friends,

The needs of the underprivileged throughout the world continue to pose a challenge for all in a position to serve. Of particular concern to us at Doorways to Hope are parentless children who are the most vulnerable, impressionable, and too often, marginalized members of society. When we open our eyes to the challenges they face in certain parts of the world, the scope of the problem can be overwhelming.

I, along with other Doorways to Hope team members, have been exposed to the reality of child soldiers and suicide bombers in Afghanistan. Recent reporting has highlighted how austerity measures in Europe has led to the significant growth in the use of "baby hatches" where unwanted infants are left anonymously for government caretakers to take away. Scores of similar examples demonstrate the continuing need for us to answer the overt calling in the Old and New Testaments to care for orphans.

I consider it a privilege to serve on the board of an organization that is seeking innovative, efficient, and sustainable ways to place orphans and foster children in loving families within their home country. I am aware of no other organization whose strategy has the same potential for widespread reduction in the numbers of the "Orphan Nation." Doorways to Hope's method of ministry is different than international adoption. International adoption provides a wonderful opportunity to those who can participate, and we support those families who choose that path. At the same time, we realize that financial and diplomatic barriers reduce the number of kids who can be adopted internationally. Doorways to Hope programs are assisting orphaned children at a fraction of the cost by placing them in families within their home country.

The sacrifices of our staff to make Doorways to Hope programs a reality are truly remarkable. Our board's commitment to transparency and accountability have enabled the organization to grow effectively and responsibly since it began as a very small group of volunteers four years ago. Thank you for your interest in Doorways to Hope, and we hope that you will consider joining our effort for the sake of those children who find themselves in the greatest need.
